Our community is justifiably proud of playing a leading role in Australia in the introduction of medium scale renewable energy generation, even though these projects are common in many countries overseas.

In summary, I believe that community initiated and controlled renewable energy project can play a vital role in Australia's transition to a clean energy future and should be actively supported by the Clean Energy Finance Corporation.

Community based medium-scale renewable energy projects can:

- Tap sources of capital not available to utility scale developments.
- Spread the economic benefits of renewable energy developments more widely into rural communities.
- Actively engage local communities in learning about and participating in the development of renewable energy infrastructure.

The CEFC should:

- Recognise the value of engaging the community in the clean energy transition by specifically supporting community energy projects.
- Ensure that community projects are not ruled out due to their relatively small scale.
- Make provision for early stage equity investment in community projects.
