



COVID-19 RELIEF AND RECOVERY FUND

The Australian Government has established a \$1 billion COVID-19 Relief and Recovery Fund to support regions, communities and industry sectors that have been disproportionately affected by the Coronavirus crisis. The initiatives announced under the Fund are supporting industries including aviation, agriculture, fisheries, tourism and the arts.

HOW DOES THE FUND WORK?

The Deputy Prime Minister chairs a Ministerial Advisory Group, which meets regularly to consider proposals submitted from across a number of portfolios.

Funding is channelled through existing mechanisms where possible to ensure support is provided quickly. New funding mechanisms are established where there is a critical need.

Initiatives under the Fund are administered by the department or agency with the relevant sector responsibilities.

WHAT KINDS OF SUPPORT ARE AVAILABLE?

Support is tailored to meet the needs of communities and industries that need assistance during the crisis and into recovery. This includes:

- fee or levy relief applied through existing mechanisms requiring little or no action by businesses;
- increasing payments through existing grant programs in ways that are quick and simple to deliver; and
- establishing targeted new programs to support the particular needs of an industry sector.

HOW CAN INDUSTRIES, REGIONAL BODIES OR COMMUNITIES APPLY FOR ASSISTANCE?

REGIONAL AIRLINES FUNDING ASSISTANCE

The Australian Government is providing \$100 million to assist smaller regional domestic air service providers to help manage cash flow issues they may be experiencing as a result of the impacts of the Coronavirus. This is helping these service providers to maintain essential connectivity for regional and remote communities. Air service providers can apply to the Government to be considered for support for assistance on a month-by-month basis, where there is a demonstrated need.

Eligibility

Airlines that operate Regular Public Transport air services are eligible to apply, as are contracted aero-medical providers and a range of essential services providers.

Timing

Funding will be available upon application, and up to monthly thereafter, through to 30 September 2020, with flexibility to consider airlines' individual circumstances.

Administration

Applications for support from air service providers will need to include a range of financial information and can be made to the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

The contribution of the service providers to regional communities, in line with the Government's priority of maintaining minimum connectivity across the country, will be considered. Payments will be in the form of a grant, with a funding agreement put in place with each successful applicant.

REGIONAL AIR NETWORK ASSISTANCE

The Australian Government is providing \$198 million to assist domestic commercial airlines to maintain a basic level of connectivity across their network of regional routes. This is supporting critical air services, connecting regional Australia to freight, medical testing, supplies and essential personnel.

Eligibility

Airlines that operated Regular Public Transport air services in regional locations prior to the Coronavirus crisis are eligible to apply for a grant to operate a basic level of air connectivity per week on each route, for an initial period of up to six weeks. The Program is underwriting these services on a shortfall subsidy basis, with the cost offset by remaining commercial revenue from passengers and freight.

Timing

The services supported by this grant opportunity are for flights undertaken from 28 March to 30 September 2020. Applications close 31 August 2020.

Administration

Applications will be assessed by the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

A grant agreement will be put in place with each successful applicant.

AIRFREIGHT SUPPORT

The Australian Government has set up a \$110 million **International Freight Assistance Mechanism (IFAM)** to keep open key international freight links with trading partners for goods coming into and going out of Australia.

IFAM will support the efforts of businesses trading internationally, including in the agricultural, seafood and healthcare sectors, to re-establish key global supply chains, which have been disrupted by the Coronavirus, supporting the international economic recovery. IFAM is essential to helping secure items critical to the ongoing health response in Australia, such as essential medical supplies, medicines and personal protective equipment.

IFAM is a targeted, emergency and temporary measure helping Australian business in its efforts to deal with the Coronavirus crisis.

LEVY RELIEF FOR COMMONWEALTH FISHERIES

The Australian Government is waiving the final two instalments of levies for Commonwealth managed fisheries, reducing levies for the 2019-20 financial year by two thirds. This will support fishers' cash flow during the outbreak, and help them remain viable and able to return to full production when the outbreak subsides. Many Commonwealth managed fisheries are struggling with a loss of export markets and the diversion of traditionally exported seafood onto the domestic market at lower than normal prices and higher input costs.

Eligibility

This measure will apply to all Commonwealth managed fishers who pay levies to the Australian Fisheries Management Authority (AFMA). Fishers who have already paid their second instalment will have that money refunded.

Timing

The second and third instalments of Commonwealth fisheries levies do not need to be paid.

Administration

No action is required from fishers, they will be notified of the changed requirements.

ADDITIONAL FUNDING FOR THE EXPORT MARKET DEVELOPMENT GRANTS SCHEME

The Australian Government is providing an immediate cash flow boost to eligible Export Market Development Grants (EMDG) applicants in the 2019-20 financial year.

The EMDG scheme reimburses small and medium-sized businesses up to 50 per cent of their eligible overseas market-promotion and export-development activities, to a maximum of \$150,000. This new initiative will increase funding for the 2019-20 financial year by almost \$50 million so that eligible applicants receive their full entitlement.

Total funding for the EMDG scheme will now reach \$207.7 million for 2019-20.

This initiative is helping eligible exporters to retain staff and sustain their business. It will also improve prospects for small businesses that want to reinvest in export promotion once the Coronavirus crisis has passed.

Eligibility

Additional funding will benefit more than 1,600 exporters that have already applied for reimbursement under the EMDG scheme, but who would otherwise have received a lower reimbursement.

Timing

Recipients whose claims have already been assessed have received their additional payment. The remaining funds will be paid as the outstanding claims are assessed.

Administration

Additional funding is being distributed to eligible recipients by Austrade. Eligible businesses will receive the additional payment automatically.

SUPPORTING INDIGENOUS VISUAL ARTS CENTRES

This \$7 million contribution to the Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support (IVAIS) Program is supporting Indigenous Art Centres and Indigenous Art Fairs during the Coronavirus crisis and beyond. Payments are being made directly to IVAIS-funded Indigenous Art Centres and IVAIS-funded Art Fairs to maintain operations and employment levels, ensuring that they continue to support artists and their communities.

Because of travel restrictions and the impact on tourism, as well as the economic downturn, Indigenous Art Centres throughout Australia will not be able to achieve normal sales in the peak tourism and art sales season. The Supporting Indigenous Visual Arts Centres initiative will ensure that IVAIS-funded Indigenous Art Centres are well placed to re-enter the market once the Coronavirus crisis has passed, and that IVAIS-funded Art Fairs are in place to assist to build the market for art by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Eligibility

Grants will be provided to Indigenous Art Centres and Indigenous Art Fairs that already receive funding through the IVAIS Program.

Payments of up to \$85,000 will be made to each IVAIS-funded Indigenous Art Centre, spread across 2019-20 and 2020-21. Payments of up to \$70,000 will be made to each IVAIS-funded Indigenous Art Fair in 2020-21.

Timing

Art Centres will receive the funds across two payments – one in 2019-20 and one in 2020-21. Art Fairs will receive one payment in 2020-21.

Administration

Funding recipients do not need to apply for funding. Payments will be made directly to IVAIS-funded Indigenous Art Centres and IVAIS-funded Indigenous Art Fairs through the IVAIS Program.

Funding will be tied to existing funding agreements with IVAIS-funded Art Centres and IVAIS-funded Art Fairs, administered by the Office for the Arts within the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

CRISIS RELIEF FOR REGIONAL ARTS

This \$10 million measure for the Regional Arts Fund will provide crisis relief and targeted support to organisations, artists and arts workers that are critical to delivering the arts to communities in regional and remote areas.

Regional communities have been severely affected by the shutdown of arts venues and restrictions on tourism.

This targeted support from the Australian Government will allow Regional Arts Australia to support artists, arts workers and small-to-medium entities outside Australia's metropolitan centres to be adaptable and productive throughout this period of crisis, in response to the needs of their communities. It will also assist them to develop new ways of working and establish new networks and resources for communities.

Regional Arts Australia is an established not-for-profit body with an intimate understanding of the challenges that regional organisations face as a focal point for communities, and their artistic and cultural identity. These organisations serve as community pillars, often in partnership with health, education and employment services.

Projects will need to demonstrate community need and respond to the requirements over coming months to provide relief now, as well as recovery later, from the effects of the Coronavirus crisis.

Eligibility

Assistance delivered through the Regional Arts Fund will provide targeted support to arts organisations and artists in regional and remote Australia whose communities have been affected by shutdowns in response to the Coronavirus crisis.

Timing

Funding has been delivered through the Government's Regional Arts Fund in the 2019-20 financial year.

Administration

Funding will be delivered through the existing Regional Arts Fund framework. This comprises Regional Arts Australia and a network of state- and territory-based regional program administrator organisations that deliver the funding to arts organisations and artists on behalf of the Australian Government. Funding to Regional Arts Australia will be delivered through an agreement administered by the Office for the Arts within the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

SUPPORT ACT: CRISIS RELIEF TO ARTISTS, CREW AND MUSIC WORKERS

This \$10 million contribution to the performing arts industry charity Support Act will enable it to provide immediate crisis relief to artists, crew and music workers affected by the Coronavirus crisis.

Support Act is the Australian charity that is delivering crisis relief services for people who work in the Australian music and broader arts industry who are experiencing ill health, injury, or a crisis that affects their ability to work. This support from the Australian Government will enable Support Act to roll out much needed emergency support immediately.

Eligibility

Assistance from Support Act will provide emergency support to musicians, artists, technicians, sound engineers, roadies and other support workers in the live performance industry who have been affected by the shutdown of venues, festivals and other events in response to the Coronavirus crisis.

Timing

Funding has been delivered to Support Act in 2019-20 so that it can begin providing support to the sector immediately.

Administration

Funding has been provided to Support Act through a funding agreement administered by the Office for the Arts within the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications.

SUPPORTING AUSTRALIA'S EXHIBITING ZOOS AND AQUARIUMS

This initiative will provide vital funding to exhibiting zoos and aquariums whose tourism revenue stream has stopped as a result of the travel and social distancing restrictions in place to limit the spread of Coronavirus.

Funding will assist these businesses with the fixed operational costs associated with caring for animals, and will help exhibiting zoos and aquariums to remain viable and ready to welcome tourists when restrictions are eased.

Eligibility

Austrade is working with the Zoo and Aquarium Association (ZAA) and state and territory tourism organisations to identify businesses that will be eligible for this assistance. These businesses will be exhibiting animal attractions that are important at a national, state or regional level as they contribute to conservation and presentation of animals, and drive interstate and international visitation.

Eligible exhibiting zoos and aquariums will have access to a grant that contributes towards up to six months of its animal welfare operating costs. This includes animal feed, veterinarian and other specialised care expenses, and utilities directly related to housing and caring for animals.

The grant will not cover staffing costs as the Australian Government's JobKeeper program already provides support in this area. Capital expenditure or administration costs associated with the general operation of the business are also excluded.

As state and territory governments have primary carriage of animal welfare issues, this program only focuses on exhibiting zoos and aquariums and does not provide assistance to animal refuges and rescue organisations. Nor does it cover nature-based and on-farm experiences, farms, fisheries, reserves and marine-based experiences.

Timing

An initial payment will be made within 10 days of eligible applicants executing a funding agreement. The balance has been paid from 1 July 2020 when the expenses of eligible applicants who can show an ongoing decline in revenue of at least 30 per cent have been established.

Austrade has contacted all eligible businesses in May 2020.

Administration

Eligible zoos and aquariums identified by ZAA or state and territory tourism organisations have been invited by Austrade to submit an application for a grant.

COMMONWEALTH NATIONAL PARKS – SUPPORT FOR TOURISM – FEE WAIVERS

This initiative assists businesses operating in Commonwealth National Parks by:

- Providing temporary relief from licence fees and permit charges levied by the Director of National Parks for the period of 1 January 2020 to 31 March 2021. The support will provide immediate respite from some operating costs and enable businesses to re-commence operations without having to pay for licences and permits.
- Free park entry. The introduction of free entry to the iconic Kakadu, Uluru, and Booderee National Parks, announced by the Australian Government in March 2020, will stay in place for the remainder of 2020. This will provide additional incentives for travellers to visit these must see destinations once travel restrictions are relaxed.
- Providing rent relief to tenants of the Australian National Botanic Gardens in accordance with the Australian Government's Rent Relief Policy.

TEMPORARY WAIVER OF ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT CHANGE IN THE GREAT BARRIER REEF MARINE PARK

This \$8.1 million initiative temporarily waives the Environmental Management Charge for the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park until 31 December 2020.

RENEWING REEF HQ AQUARIUM

This initiative provides \$2.6 million for Reef HQ Aquarium to ensure the critical systems that control the environment within the aquarium are upgraded and maintained, supporting the health and wellbeing of the living exhibits while the aquarium is closed.

FREE FINANCIAL COUNSELLING AND RECOVERY SUPPORT FOR REGIONAL SMALL BUSINESSES

The Regional Recovery Small Business Support Program provides over \$4.7 million to the Rural Financial Counselling Service (RFCS) for free financial counselling to help eligible small businesses in regional areas; to understand their financial position, identify options and implement plans to improve their long-term financial viability.

This program covers small regional businesses facing hardship due to the Coronavirus crisis that are not already supported by drought and/or bushfire financial counselling measures.

An additional 18 financial counsellors and nine support workers will help small businesses access immediate assistance and navigate the road to recovery.

Up to \$5,000 is also available per small business to access specialist third-party advice (e.g. legal, taxation, accounting or marketing advice) to support the recovery process.

This measure is designed to ensure that small businesses in regional Australia can access immediate assistance to remain resilient through the Coronavirus downturn and maintain the capacity to rebound when normal trading conditions resume.

Eligibility

To be eligible for free financial counselling and recovery support, a small business must:

- employ 19 or fewer people;
- be experiencing, or be at imminent risk of, financial hardship due to the impacts of the Coronavirus
- be located in a regional area (that is, **not** located within 20 kilometres of a town with a population greater than 50,000); and
- be ineligible to access regular RFCS counselling services.

Timing

This initiative will be delivered to 30 June 2021.

Administration

This assistance is part of the Australian Government's \$1 billion COVID-19 Relief and Recovery Fund, providing assistance to sectors, regions and communities disproportionately affected by the economic impacts of the Coronavirus crisis.

RFCS providers will be funded to deliver the program across regional areas.

SEAFOOD SECTOR COVID-19 SUPPORT – ‘EAT SEAFOOD AUSTRALIA’ CAMPAIGN

This initiative supports the survival and recovery of Australia’s seafood sector by delivering a 12-month national awareness campaign that encourages Australians to eat healthier, sustainable Australian seafood.

The Australian seafood sector has been severely and disproportionately impacted by the Coronavirus outbreak. Following the collapse of key export markets and domestic supply to the food services sector, the value of Australian fisheries and aquaculture has so far fallen by 16 per cent from 2018–19. As a result, increasing Australia’s consumption of Australian seafood is vital for the industry’s survival and recovery through the Coronavirus crisis.

The seafood sector is an important industry and employer in regional and coastal areas throughout Australia and the impacts of the Coronavirus are being disproportionately felt in these regional communities and economies. This package will support these communities and provide a valuable investment into survival, recovery and revitalisation of Australia’s seafood industries.

All areas of the Australian seafood sector, including fishers and aquaculture producers, processors, wholesalers and food service providers, will benefit from the campaign’s promotion of the industry.

Funding will deliver a 12-month national awareness campaign that provides a boost to assist the sector’s survival and bolster a strong, sector-wide recovery as markets normalise. It will increase awareness of the sector and the benefits of eating Australian seafood.

Industry, through Seafood Industry Australia (SIA), the peak national seafood representative body, will also contribute funding and ultimately lead, this proposal to ensure that the campaign strengthens the industry’s domestic position into the future.

Eligibility

The Australian Government will provide \$4 million to SIA, to lead the implementation of the national campaign.

SIA will select a full-service creative agency to manage all the elements of the campaign.

The campaign will be delivered through several platforms, including television, print and social media, and will be inclusive of all members of the Australian seafood sector, not just members of SIA.

Timing

The campaign is expected to launch in the second half of 2020 and will run for 12 months.

Administration

The grant will be provided to SIA over 2021-22.

SUPPORTING AGRICULTURAL SHOWS

This initiative provides payment to agricultural show societies to cover fixed cost expenditure in the 2020 calendar year if their show was cancelled this year because of Coronavirus restrictions or uncertainties.

The initiative consists of three components of assistance – for peak Royal Agricultural Shows in capital cities, for other agricultural shows and for Agricultural Shows Australia (ASA).

ASA, the national peak body, will be able to seek funding for its National Rural Ambassador competition for 2020 and 2021.

Eligibility

- Local agricultural shows across Australia that cancel their show in 2020 because of Coronavirus restrictions or uncertainties will be eligible to apply for funding towards covering fixed cost expenditure in the 2020 calendar year. Funding to a total of \$10.235 million will be available under this component of the program. Caps on funding will apply based on show attendance: small shows \$10,000, medium shows \$15,000 and large shows \$70,000.
- RAS undertaking the peak state agricultural show in the capital city, will be eligible to apply for funding towards covering fixed cost expenditure in the 2020 calendar year if they have cancelled their show in 2020 because of Coronavirus restrictions or uncertainties. Funding to a total of \$26 million will be available under this component of the program.
- ASA will be able to apply for up to \$100,000 to fund its National Rural Ambassador competition for 2020 and 2021.

Timing

Timing for applications for funding under the three components of the program be finalised shortly, with all payments to be made by 30 June 2021.

Administration

The program will be administered by the Community Grants Hub (CGH) on behalf of the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment.

This will be a restricted program with applications accepted only from eligible applicants: local show society members of ASA, Royal Agricultural Show societies, and ASA.

Applicants will submit applications via CGH's online system, and payments will be made directly to successful applicants.

This assistance is part of the Australian Government's \$1 billion Relief and Recovery Fund which is providing assistance to sectors, regions and communities disproportionately affected by the economic impacts of the Coronavirus.

SECURING FORESTRY RESOURCES FOR ECONOMIC RECOVERY

The Australian Government is providing \$10 million in funding to Australia's forestry industries to help manage the compounding effects of the Coronavirus crisis and the 2019-20 bushfire season.

This initiative will safeguard the future timber supply by assisting with the storage of fire-affected salvage logs, processed timber products, and other forestry products.

This initiative will help mitigate the effects of the Coronavirus economic downturn and the bushfire-induced short-term timber oversupply by extending the life of fire-affected timber that must be harvested now.

Storage assistance will support rural and regional jobs, and will strengthen Australia's capacity to continue using domestically grown sustainable wood products.

Storage will ensure Australia is well-resourced with construction grade timber and other wood products to assist with future rebounds in the housing and construction market.

Australia's forest products are a vital resource, managed over timelines of more than 30 years. The Australian Government is committed to ensuring the combined Coronavirus crisis and bushfire events do not pose a multi-decade setback for the industry.

Eligibility

Funding will be available to industry through the state governments to support the establishment costs of storage facilities for salvage logs and processed timber.

The Australian Government is working with the relevant state governments on the design and implementation of this assistance, and will support existing programs where applicable.

Timing

The Australian Government funding will be delivered in 2020-21 through partnerships with the relevant state governments.

Administration

TEMPORARY OIL RECYCLING SECTOR SUPPORT

This initiative temporarily increases the subsidy paid to oil recyclers under the Product Stewardship Oil Scheme for category one oil from 50 cents per litre to 62 cents per litre.

The Australian Government established the Product Stewardship Oil Scheme in 2001 to address the mismanagement of unconsumed used oils.

The Australian Government pays a benefit to oil recyclers to incentivise the collection and re-refinement of waste oil.

Feedback from industry is that Australia's oil recyclers collect and recycle used oil from over 48,000 waste oil producers across the country, such as mechanics, car dealerships, factories, passenger transport, freight, service stations and heavy industry.

The temporary funding supports an industry severely affected by COVID-19, with 50 per cent of Australia's waste oil refineries having shut down for 'care and maintenance' and industry estimates showing at least 25 per cent of waste oil is at risk of not being collected.

Australian oil recycling refineries directly employ around 600 people and thousands of contractors, in urban and regional areas.

The additional funding supports oil recycling refineries across Australia to remain operational, protecting jobs and the environment.

Eligibility

Oil re-processors claiming the category one benefit will be eligible to receive the increased subsidy for the period 1 July to 31 December 2020.

Timing

Once the *Product Stewardship (Oil) Regulations 2000* has been amended the increased benefit will be applicable to the period 1 July 2020 to 31 December 2020.

Administration

The Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment will amend the *Product Stewardship (Oil) Regulations 2000* to increase the category one benefit amount to 62 cents per litre for the period 1 July 2020 to 31 December 2020. After this amendment, claims will be administered by the Australian Taxation Office.

This assistance is part of the Australian Government's \$1 billion Relief and Recovery Fund which is providing assistance to sectors, regions and communities disproportionately affected by the economic impacts of COVID-19.
