



The garden is located on the grounds of **Christian Family Centre** Adjacent to Risdon Prison At it's peak between 2012 and 2019 the garden produced in excess of 4 tonnes of produce per year – donated directly to communities in need The Garden became over-ran and unmanaged during a number of prison lockdowns & Covid-19

With the support of a number of key partners we believe this project has a strong future and can provide many benefits to the Tasmanian community



PRISON GARDEN PROGRAM – BACKGROUND 2012 - 2021

Commencing in 2012, garden beds were prepared and plans were established to grow a wide variety of crops suitable for redistribution and consumption within some of Tasmania's most vulnerable communities - especially those identified as experiencing food insecurity.

The gardens within the Risdon Prison Precinct and local area in Southern Tasmania included:

- o A garden within the Ron Barwick Minimum Security Prison
- A garden within the Risdon Prison Complex (maximum and minimum security)
- The 'Cow Paddock',
- 'Norm's Paddock' the Christian Family Centre adjacent to the prison precinct at Risdon Vale and,
- The community garden at nearby, Risdon Vale Neighborhood Centre

Once the produce was harvested, it was collected and redistributed by SecondBite, a charity whose mission is to redistribute surplus fresh food to vulnerable Australians. The gardeners - inmates from the prison - were in turn, acknowledged by SecondBite and awarded certificates of appreciation for their efforts.

Under Section 42 of the Corrections Act 1997, prisoners are given day release to participate in community programs thus, making available a reliable daily workforce to volunteer at gardens which were external to the prison - but within the prison precinct and, in the community.

Unfortunately, the program was abandoned in 2017 due to resourcing issues at the prison however all up, over 14 tonnes of produce was redistributed in the community. Plans to revitalize the garden were dealt a further blow with the advent of the COVID - 19 pandemic

Sustainability of the project is critical- we will utilise volunteer support from our partners to support the program as required & during unforeseen events. Volunteers from Christian Family Centre, various garden clubs & support from Volunteering Tasmania will help maintain the garden as required

Variety Tasmania will support individuals and families impacted by incarceration, domestic violence and abuse



Tas Tafe will provide support through education & Training programs to support inmates and their involvement in the program



CVGT will support engaging with inmates (especially those who are preparing for release) to enhance employment prospects

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Auspice by Eat Well Tasmania Inc and with the support of various partners we believe we have a shovel ready program that can be underway as soon as early 2022

Breaking the Cycle – A Safer Community: Strategies for Improving Throughcare for Offenders 2016 – 2020



The Breaking the Cycle vision for the Tasmanian corrections system is:

A reduction in reoffending and an increase in the ongoing safety of the Tasmanian community by providing a safe, secure, humane and effective correctional system with opportunities for rehabilitation, personal development, reintegration and community engagement.

Our vision for throughcare in the corrections system is:

To provide a quality and collaborative throughcare model in partnership with other agencies and the community that supports people across the corrections system, with coordinated assistance and interventions to maximise the potential of each individual.

Goal 3 – To contribute to a reduction in reoffending by case managing individuals throughout their sentence and by providing interventions and opportunities to enable each person to achieve positive and sustainable changes

- Increase opportunities to engage in education and training
- Encourage individuals serving a period of imprisonment to give back to the community through increasing the provision of programs developed in partnership with non-government organisations, e.g. the Community Gardens, Sustainable Prisons Project in the Risdon Prison Complex, Hand Made With Pride in Mary Hutchinson Women's Prison, and Pups on Parole in the Ron Barwick Minimum Security Prison
- Enhance the range of productive employment opportunities provided to increase skills and employability on release
- Develop and introduce a purposeful activity driven working day for prisoners

This project will have a direct benefit to the goals of the Breaking the Cycle vision

GOVERNMENT STRATEGY & POLICY SNAPSHOT

OUR PROJECT HAS DIRECT LINKS TO A NUMBER OF KEY TASMANIAN STATE GOVERNMENT PRIORITIES

- > Premier's Economic and Social Advisory Council (PERSAC) recommendations 31 and 32 to address food insecurity and create place-based solutions
 - Expand on recent trials of school lunch provision to include greater school and community provision
 - Adopt a place-based approach to community food security models and not a 'one size fits all' approach.
 - Include strong links to local agricultural and hospitality businesses including training opportunities for program participants.
 - Scalable in design so that any potential increase in demand for emergency food relief can be managed in a rapid and effective manner.
- > Food relief to Food Security Strategy <u>Tasmanian Food Security Strategy 2021-2024</u>
- > The Tasmanian Liberal Government's School Lunch Pilot has been extended with 15 schools now selected to participate next year, and a further 15 to join in 2023.

We know that nutrition can impact on a young person's ability to concentrate and learn, and our \$1.4 million Food For Thought school lunch pilot will further remove barriers to learning, so that more students can fully participate and engage at school.

Priority has been given to schools in areas of most need, with the program to build on the school lunches pilot that was led by the Tasmanian School Canteen Association's (TSCA) in late 2020, and in response to the PESRAC recommendations to build and enhance the food security of our community.

Through the production of fresh, healthy produce – the Food for Thought project has the capacity to have an direct positive impact on this program and the students who will benefit from the School Lunch program

OTHER SUCCESSFUL MODELS





The Clink works in partnership with Her Majesty's Prison & Probation Service to deliver 14 training projects: 4 restaurants, 6 kitchens, 3 gardens and 1 events catering business.

INTRODUCTION

All projects utilise our Five Step Integrated Programme to ensure that students receive the support they need, not only while they are in prison but also post-release: Recruit, Train, Support, find Employment and Mentor.

GARDENS

The Clink Gardens began at HMP High Down and continue at HMP High Down and HMP Send. Prisoners work to gain experience and achieve City & Guilds NVQ Level 2 in Horticulture. The salad, fruit, vegetables, herbs and eggs produced from the gardens are delivered daily to our restaurants.

KITCHENS

In February 2021, The Clink Charity announced plans to roll out the Clink Kitchens integrated training programme to 70 prisons in England and Wales over the next three years.

Our trainers deliver high quality City & Guilds accredited training in Food Preparation and Cookery within the existing prison kitchens. Supported by New Futures Network and Her Majesty's Prison and Probation Service, The Clink will deliver training for up to 2,000 men and women in prisons to achieve qualifications in hospitality and gain employment upon release, proven to dramatically reduce reoffending.
