found this most convenient with always an ANZ bank in every country town we have ever lived in.

Several years ago the local ANZ branch here in St Helens closed its doors and told us to take our banking to Scottsdale.

Scottsdale is over a range of mountains, and takes approximately one hour and three quarters to drive. But no sooner

had ANZ said that – they closed Scottsdale too. Fortunately we chose to stay local and joined the Commonwealth Bank, and

now we also have in our town, our very own Bendigo Bank as well. Thank you Bendigo for coming to town!

However the Commonwealth in the last few weeks has decided they only want to open for 3.5 hours each day.

How convenient this is for local bank customers ! I think not. So each day at 1pm they close their doors. For people

out of town, or businesses within the town needing change or advice – do it in the mornings or you miss out.

The other section of our community who are not catered for in these new arrangements are our elderly. Many of them

are not familiar with digital banking and prefer face to face customer service. Mornings are not always convenient for them

and so again they are missing out.

service to communities either in the cities or in rural and regional Australia. It is all about making a profit. Service is sadly
